

AREA DELEGATE'S REPORT:

AREA B NORTH EASTERN REGION REPORT TO ASSEMBLY 2nd NOVEMBER 2019

Good morning everybody! Chris. Alcoholic. I'm especially excited about presenting this report today. A warm Aussie welcome to those of you who may have joined us by phoning in to the conference call. It is heartening to know that by adopting some new technology – Bill W would have loved it, I'm sure – we can be united as an Area in spirit and in reality! It is a problem over which I have pondered many times during the last 3 plus years, and to think that the solution is at hand and may prove to be so simple! All I ask is that everybody exercise patience as we work through the teething problems together. I'm sure it won't be a total stroll in the park without any hassles, but together we should be able to make it work for our Area. And of course, a big vote of thanks to Cliff, Brian and Gerry for putting it all together and testing it out.

Since my last report I have attended the following events and functions.

On Aug 31st I was part of a Teleconference for the Agenda subcommittee. This is the meeting that decides which Topics will go forward to Conference. Many of the topics which were submitted were repeats of repeats, with the flavour of 2019 being either Rotation not very well disguised as another shot at the "get rid of Valerie campaign", or a 2/3rd majority of Delegates. I will return to this specific subject shortly.

Also, on August 31st I attended a Group Conscience at Bowen Hills to explain the structure.

September 13-14, I attended the National Forum of the PICPC (Public Information and Cooperation with the Professional Community) in Chatswood.

I participated in the test conference call. It sounded good to me.

The Coomera Concepts meeting every month, is amazing. It has proven to be invaluable to me, in terms of regularly meeting up with like-minded people, and to focus on the Third Legacy. It is well worth the travel and effort.

I attend a small group in Cleveland, which meets monthly to read AA Comes of Age. Invaluable. There's something about doing this sort of reading in a group which makes it very meaningful.

I attended the District 9 Topics Forum. I've been to three or four of these now, and people seem to find them useful. Hopefully if our Topic is accepted there will be more time to discuss Topics in the future.

And I leave tomorrow to travel to Sydney to attend my final Conference.

ROTATION AND CRITICISM

To return to the subject raised when I spoke about the Agenda Committee.

The principle of rotation only works if those people who have served their time as Trusted Servants, have the grace and common sense to take a big step backwards to leave the new incumbents to get on with the job. Some people seem incapable of accepting the decisions of the Group Conscience, and they keep repeatedly returning to the issue. Our duty as members of AA is to accept the majority decision, and even if we don't agree with it, we must do our best to work with it – not against it. OR AT LEAST NOT CRITICISE. Yes. It's hard at times; however, rotation is one of our greatest spiritual principles. Followed closely by Trusting our Trusted Servants. So, it seems a shame to me that some Trusted Servants don't trust themselves, let alone the process. Of course, we all need to ask advice or direction from time to time, and if it's offered to give it due consideration, because it usually has some merit. Rotation may possibly be the most difficult principle in Service to come to grips with. As ego driven individuals, we want to be the best at everything, but once the baton has been passed to the next person, we must trust that new trusted servant to do the job as they see fit, and if that's not the way we would do it, then too bad. How important is it if the new treasurer, for example sets out the accounts and reports in a different way? He or she is the Trusted Servant with the Right of Decision. As long as the information is there, let's be grateful that the job is being done.

When any group holds a GC, God is asked to be in the room. He/She/It is the ultimate authority. We ask God to direct our collective thinking. Our duty is to be informed. To listen attentively to all the debate. To ask relevant questions. To contribute if we have something pertinent to say, and to vote intelligently, with the greater good of AA Australia uppermost in our minds. Whatever decisions are made, no matter our personal opinion, it becomes the duty of every member to support the decision made. This is Unity in action. It is not the right or privilege of any member to leave the room with a plan to have the decision manipulated to conform to one's own agenda. This principle applies through all our fellowship.

2/3rd MAJORITY OF DELEGATES. WITH REFERENCE TO SOME OF THE TOPICS.

In the conference attendance records collated from 2000 to the present day, there has never been a $2/3^{rd}$ majority of Delegates at Conference in Australia, and we seem to have gotten on pretty well. In the USA with their 90 delegates it's not difficult to get a clear $2/3^{rd}$ majority of DELEGATE'S bums on seats. I tend to agree with the school of thought which indicates that Bill could see that a clear $2/3^{rd}$ majority of any of the voters at any business meeting of AA, including Conference, would preclude disagreements or doubtful outcomes. I've had several conversations lately with a person with over 40 years of Sobriety, and who has probably attended more Annual Conferences than any other member in Australia. He tells me that there is not one Australian General Service manager who has escaped the nasty net cast wide by the critics. Some have succumbed and left the job too early. Our current manager is more tenacious. She has an awesome capacity to rise above, and she does a wonderful job for us, to a very high standard, despite having to face many personal and workplace challenges.

So, I'd like to set a few matters straight, at least here in Area B., where thankfully we do not have the numbers of misguided whiners, as in other Areas.

- The General Service Manager is an employee of the Board.
- He/she is subject to the employment laws of this country including security of tenure, and a proper salary.
- The position is NOT subject to rotation. No sane person goes into a job with the expectation of being demoted. When AA members take a position, they go into it knowing that after a period of time they will rotate – hopefully not away, but on to something else. The employees in New York do rotate around all the Service Desks, but they do it at the same level or salary scale. Like any other citizen they can apply for promotion – when there is a vacancy.
- Our tiny office has 3 employees who are all recovered alcoholics serving this fellowship the best way
 they know how. They do not deserve to be subject to abuse or unjust, ignorant criticism from any
 person, let alone members of AA who are supposed to be working a spiritual programme. I have had
 many an occasion to ring the office, more so during the last three years, and I've always been treated
 respectfully, and had my questions answered.

This is a bittersweet moment for me. My last Assembly as your Delegate, and indeed as a resident of Australia. I'm sure the word is out that I will be leaving to live in New Zealand again, once my term as Delegate is completed on January 1st. I can't express enough how grateful I am to have been given the opportunity to serve as a Delegate. It is an amazing privilege. I know I have benefitted and grown as a person, and as an AA member. I have been fully supported by the two committees: Tiffany as Chair, Glenn as Secretary and Linda as Treasurer, and now by Di as Chair, Melissa as Secretary, and Therese as Treasurer. I probably shouldn't name names, because every attendee at every Assembly is equally important. My point is that it's been really good to be able to phone up and ask a question, or to put an idea to somebody who is doing their best to practice all three legacies, and who can see beyond what I have come to see as pogo stick – or one legacy recovery! That may sound harsh; however, we were gifted 3 legacies of recovery, and each should be considered in equal measure. I suspect that the question we will be asked when we get to the Big Meeting in the Sky will be "What did you do with the gift that I gave you"?

In closing, all I can suggest is that we become as informed as we possibly can, on the structure and the literature. Study the Traditions and Concepts and try to apply those beautiful principles in our lives. Do our collective best to pass on the whole message. Encourage sponsees to join us in service. I hope never again to hear the words "you're not ready for that" or "it's just politics" or "they always argue, and I can't stand conflict." I call BS on that. What other group of people do you know of who enjoyed and participated in conflict more than us? The only difference now is that having been gifted a set of spiritual principles with which to solve our conflicts, we need to learn and persevere in using them so our primary purpose can be fulfilled.

PI REPORT:

What is was.....

A two-day forum with local and international speakers. Held in the community centre at Chatswood on the northern outskirts if Sydney.

It was an opportunity for area representatives to provide an update on activity and ideas from their respective areas.

There were also a number of "professional" speakers who addressed specific topics and took questions from the floor; Dr Jenny, a female GP from the northern beaches, Dr Faiz, a neuro biologist and Kenny G, a psychologist.

At the end of the conference a USB was available for purchase (\$15) that provided a range of content, including word docs, PowerPoint presentations and audio files.

The main objective of the conference was to help keep PI active and alive and introduce or share ideas from other parts of the AA network. A key element of the discussion related to the modernisation of AA information and approach, social media and digitalisation.

PI includes a number of topic areas:

- Information Packs
- The help line
- Big Book
- Stories from members
- Making tea at home groups
- Talking to other members

Actions all help us to stay united and support the twelve traditions and concepts.

- Conference approved literature helps AA ideas for posters, videos and flyers can all be down-loaded and shared.
- The general service conference also helps delegates with content and support.
- PI is helped because members are asked to view topics which are then given to delegates and taken to conference for review/change and approval.
- One member might have an idea which can be formally accepted and implemented as part of the fellowship toolkit democracy in action.

Key message was that to be of use to the public, we need to be knowledgeable and well informed about the workings of AA and the approved literature that is available.

We must keep trying to improve - "good is often the enemy of best"

To keep AA, we must give it away – public information.

Let it begin with:

- Relationships in AA
- Counsellors/Social workers
- Large companies
- Doctors/medical professionals
- Police/Clergy
- Aged care facilities
- Schools

Persistence in passing on the message – it doesn't matter if we are a member, a trustee on the service board – remember the 5th tradition. Every group has one primary purpose - to carry the message to the alcoholic that still suffers.

Remote communities' funds national and local coordinators to do PI work and take the message to the community. This may be the only Big Book content they see. Local. We must also encourage professionals in remote communities to come to interact with us as we travel through these communities and set up teas and lunches (this was the format of the recent tag-a-long earlier this year).

Meeting the professionals in Longreach and Murgon was an opportunity to distribute Big Books – some remote members drove 120 KM to attend these meetings – how far would you go? Some of these communities do not have any access to internet and some people may not be good at reading and writing – campfires and face to face meetings can carry the message.

How can we help?

- Raise funds encourage businesses or large companies to donate financial aid
- Have professional lunches
- Take literature packs to places that don't have any
- Participate in Skype meetings
- Contact local radio stations and the local police
- The police and courts are a valuable and effective way to pass on the message.

Aged Care Facilities

- Alcohol is a real risk for older people
- Provide literature to the facilities, ensuring that it is suitable for them
- Set up visits and talk with local care associations
- Personal one on one discussions with staff can also help
- Find out about the Council of ageing
- You can take older people in aged care to meetings
- Even people in palliative care may benefit from the message

Other areas which may benefit from PI

- Armed forces
- Deaf communities
- Be careful to speak knowledgeably
- First impressions are very important
- Always be aware of the audience do not speak in a dogmatic way.

These meetings evolved so that at the residential section of the prison, the prisoners were running the meeting and members came from outside to support and participate. At that time meetings were also held at the farm section of the centre. However, once a long-term construction phase began, the prison authorities cut the meetings in the secure sections allowing the residential and farm meetings to continue. But after a few months these were ceased as well. The prison made this decision based on security risk due to the construction.

In the last month or so we have had an inquiry from the Indigenous Officer at the centre as to when we are going to commence meetings again, but it is this officer's manager that has to provide permission. Therefore, we are waiting to be invited again and will continue to monitor the progress. Thank you for your inquiry about prison involvement in the CQ region. I hope this is helpful and happy for you to pass on my contact details to anyone who has questions.


Extract from Scouts Queensland letter:

Scouts Queensland supporter registration is \$20 per annum. This allows supporters to camp in any Scouts facility with campsites. The usual fee of \$11 per person per night, also applies. The application to become a supporter is below or can be found onsite at Baden Powell Park.

We had been supplementing our revenues through ancillary use of the camping areas by persons in caravans and camper-trailers but that was temporarily halted when Council sought clarification of the interpretation of the zoning of the land (Boy Scout Purposes).

Council has indicated to us that that camping or caravanning is permissible so long as those persons camping have an association or connection with Boy Scout Purposes. We now intend to pursue the following scheme:

- those connected with Scouting include both Members and Supporters of Scouting;
- subject to the provisos set out below, and payment of the applicable daily rate, a Supporter and his/her immediate family, would be entitled to camp on a range of Scouts Queensland campsites that accept public camping during the term of the subscription;


